#### **Platform:**

I want to increase the accessibility of the APA to resident physicians in the IAPA. Accordingly, as Resident Fellow Member Trustee I will ask YOU about OUR priorities. These include:

#### **Engaging Your Thoughts:**

Problem: I want more residents from the IAPA engaged with the APA year round to grow the membership and strengthen psychiatry's influence industry-wide.

Action: decreasing membership fees, using surveys to engage residents, and publicizing notable resident work.

# **Financial Wellness:**

Problem: Medical school financial burden limits post-residency career options due to heavy financial incentives, weakening the academic psychiatry pipeline. Psychiatrists carry the same debt burden as other residents, and improving financial wellness for psychiatric residents will improve patient access and psychiatrist satisfaction.

Action: Increase the salience of this issue through research and advocacy, using experience evidenced by my advocacy pieces in JGIM and JAMA Internal Medicine

# **Trainee Wellbeing:**

Problem: According to a recent JAMA study, 42% of psychiatry residents in their second year of residency suffer from burnout. This rate is unacceptably high—especially for psychiatrists—and our APA Burnout Committee needs to take further action to make burnout a national training priority.

Action: Publishing about burnout vividly will bring even more attention to the problem.
